### Dulles Favors Nonviolence— Behind the Iron Curtain

On November 18, Secretary of State  
John Foster Dulles, prominent Presbyter-  
ian, in addressing the annual convention  
of the CIO, called the free world to en-  
courage non-violent revolution behind the  
iron curtain. He said, "It is not necessary  
nor is it desirable, that we should try to  
foment violent revolution. That would  
mean only exposure and massacre of those  
who most cherish freedom. Non-violent  
methods can be more efficacious."

### Peace Pilgrim Nears Washington; To Present Petition to Eisenhower

Peace Pilgrim is nearing Washington,  
D.C. where she expects to present to Pres-  
ident Eisenhower a petition for the estab-  
lishment of a Peace Department in the  
presidential cabinet. The petition is signed  
by men and women all the way across  
America from Los Angeles, California to  
New York.

Peace Pilgrim started walking across the  
United States on January 1 at Los Angeles.  
She has traveled at the rate of about 25  
miles a day on foot, fasting until someone  
offers her food, sleeping out-of-doors when  
no shelter is offered. She has stopped at  
cities, villages, and crossroads when given  
the opportunity to speak for peace. Always

On October 31, a week after Manilal  
Gandhi's release from Pretoria, South Afri-  
ca prison, Patrick Duncan, son of a for-  
mer governor general, started serving a  
100-day sentence for entering a Negro sec-  
tion of Germiston last December without  
a pass. Jailed along with Duncan were  
Freda Troup, author of a book about Rev.  
Michael Scott and Betty du Toit, former  
trade union secretary. Sentences for the  
two women were 25 days. Like Gandhi, all  
three participated in the act of civil dis-  
obedience last December at Germiston.

In a joint statement issued on the day  
of their imprisonment they said: "Our par-  
ticipation in the defiance campaign was  
prompted by our deep and serious concern  
about the apartheid measures of the Union  
Government. Since our conviction there  
has been no abatement in the Govern-  
ment's efforts to widen the gulf between  
white and non-white, but, on the contrary,  
they have been pushing through their  
apartheid policy with increasing ruthless-  
ness."

her message is, "The way to peace is to  
overcome evil with good, falsehood with  
truth, and hatred with love." She amplifies  
this plea with a call to disarmament and a  
peace department in government.

On the 5000 mile jaunt through Ariz-  
ona, Texas, Kansas, Illinois, Michigan,  
Ohio, and Pennsylvania and connecting  
states Peace Pilgrim has worn out four  
pairs of shoes which have been replaced by  
friends along the way.

After presenting the Peace Department  
petition to President Eisenhower, Peace-  
Pilgrim will go to New York City to pre-  
sent a petition for disarmament to the Un-  
ited Nations.
